Is antibacterial coating of suture material helpful in preventing infection?

Kosuke Ichida, Hiroshi Noda, Rina Kikugawa, Fumi Hasegawa, Tamotsu Obitsu, Daisuke Ishioka et al: Effect of triclosan-coated sutures on the incidence of surgical site infection after abdominal wall closure in gastro-enterological surgery: a double-blind, randomized controlled trial in a single center. j.surg.2017.12.020.

This study compared surgical site superficial or deep infections (within 30 days of operation) after abdominal wall closure with Triclosan coated sutures (study group) and non-coated sutures (control group). There were 508 patients in study group and 505 patients in control group.

Conclusion: Triclosan-coated sutures did not decrease the incidence of surgical site infections after abdominal wall closure in gastroenterologic surgery.

Can we give levothyroixine weekly instead of daily in hypothyroidism?

Rajput R, Pathak V. The Effect of Daily versus Weekly Levothyroxine Replacement on Thyroid Function Test in Hypothyroid Patients at a Tertiary Care Centre in Haryana. Eur Thyroid J. 2017;6(5):250-254

In a cross-over study comparing daily verses weekly levothyroxine therapy, it was found that both are effective.

Authors' conclusions: "Our study shows that in today's era of busy and hectic schedules where it is difficult for patients to take LT4 following a rigid schedule, once weekly LT4 administration provides an alternative approach for the treatment of hypothyroidism, especially in patients where compliance is a major issue".



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Simulation in Medical Education - Dr Ashok Godhi

For more than a century, the medical students are being trained using 'Apprenticeship Model' of William Halsted; it cannot be overemphasized that the model has served its purpose; however, of late, modern approach and attitude of the community and the medical profession towards each other, have necessitated some modifications in the teaching learning process. Students learn the procedural skills by performing them on real patients. 'Learning curve' is an inseparable part of any leaning process and so are the errors. The Institute of Medicine has reported that in USA, every year 43000 to 98000 deaths occur due to preventable errors in the management of the patients; hence 'patient safety has come into sharp focus in the recent years. Patients expect that the trainees should have minimum levels of competence before they treat them. Errors are least tolerated and are often challenged in the consumer forum. Graduating students feel that there is a gap between their level of competence and the level expected by the society. Their learning depends on the type and variety of patients available in the wards and out patients at the time of their posting. Large number of medical students and limited number of patients also restrict experience. Efforts to address these limitations of the present system of medical education have resulted in revelation that simulation can provide some answers to these problems.

Simulation has been used for decades in the aviation industry to train the pilots. Simulation in medical education is comparatively a recent concept. The simulation laboratories provide safe opportunities to medical students to learn technical and non technical skills and practice them repeatedly until the predetermined proficiency is achieved. They can learn from their errors without compromising the quality of patient care. The learning experience is enjoyable and it conforms to the principles of adult learning.

Simulation technology in medical education is rapidly evolving. Use of standardised patients is the simplest simulation to teach history taking, physical examination and communication skills. Animal activism and ethical issues are slowly replacing experiments on live animals by computer simulated experiments. In some western universities anatomy is taught with the help of virtual cadaver dissection. Anaesthesiologists were among the first ones to conceive and develop models and mannequins to teach airway management and CPR. Birthing simulator is used to teach delivery. Models to teach IV access, central venous access, lumbar puncture and catheterisation are very useful. Basic skills of surgery and its subspecialties are best learnt in the skills laboratories using synthetic simulators or animal tissues.

Computerised mannequins have added a new dimension to the simulation technology. The



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modern mannequins provide real life-like learning experience; they speak and breathe; they have cardiac, respiratory and bowel sounds, radial and carotid pulse, blood pressure and reacting pupils. They can be programmed to mimic various emergency scenarios like cardiac arrhythmia, cardio respiratory arrest, respiratory strider, cyanosis, difficult airway, and tension pneumothorax. The mannequin responds to pharmacological interventions, CPBR and defibrillation. The scene is so realistic and dramatic that sometimes medical students cry when the mannequin 'dies'. Similarly neonatal and infant mannequins are used to teach paediatric students.

Laparoscopic and endoscopic surgeries have been a giant leap forward in advancing the art and science of surgery in 21st century. They need skills different from open surgery; the basic laparoscopic skills can be learnt on simple box simulators; advanced laparoscopic operations with different levels of difficulty can be practiced on virtual reality(VR) simulators. The latest VR simulators with haptics are capable of providing tactile feedback. VR simulators are very useful for teaching/learning endoscopic procedures like bronchoscopy, upper and lower GI endoscopy and endovascular procedures.

The future of simulation appears exciting. It may be possible to load the patient-specific data in to VR simulator and try pharmacological intervention or rehearse the laparoscopic surgery on the virtual patient before doing it on the real patient. The virtual patient of the future may be able to give history, exhibit physical signs and show human, social, and behavioural responses with appropriate facial expressions.

Medical colleges have a great responsibility of preparing safe doctors for the future; the simulation exercises must be structured to design curriculum which is integrated in to the existing curriculum; the skills learnt in the simulation lab are assessed to grade the level of competence; The practicing physicians also can learn new skills on the simulators. Medical education regulating councils can play an important role in establishing simulation centres in the medical colleges.

JNMC experience:

We, at J N Medical College, are one of the first few colleges to establish the simulation centre called 'Clinical Skills Lab' in 2010, funded by KLE Academy of Higher Education and research(KAHER). The lab has received an award of Rs.30 lakhs from the Vision Group of Science and Technology of Govt. of Karnataka. Ever since its inception, the lab has been active in training the students of not only medical college, but also other health care institutions of KAHER. The workshops are regularly conducted on BLS, ACLS, basic surgical skills and



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basic laparoscopic surgical skills. KAHER has decided to take the lab to the next level by setting up a Cadaver Lab which is likely to be functional in the next few months.

'Halstedean Apprenticeship Model' has stood the test of time for more than a century. Simulation technology is going enrich this model, enhance the learning experience of students of health care institutions and improve patient safety in the years to come. Simulation is not a replacement for the traditional method of medical education but is complementary to it.

Investment of time and funds in simulation technology is going to pay rich dividends. Earlier we adopt it, the better it is.

Aim And Advantages

To help the deceased member's family

Premium is very minimum comparing to any Insurance scheme. Scheme solely works on members contribution. Surgeons up to 65 years can join in the scheme.

No medical certification is needed to join the scheme.

Early settlement of death claim within a month.

Documents like Death certificate, membership identity and the City branch Secretary's Recommendation are only needed for the claim.

The bereaved family will receive an amount equivalent to 500 times the current net membership of scheme.

Eligibility of the Members

- 1. Any Life ASI member below the age of 65 years on the day of joining is eligible to become a member.
- 2. The members who joined scheme before 30.12.2017 are "FOUNDER MEMBERS" (Date extended on request)
- 3. The scheme started on 1.4.2017

ratification by the General Body.

- 4. Window period TWO YEARS i.e. Eligibility to claim will be after completing 24 months from joining scheme.
- 5. Fill up application form with specimen signatures of nominee with photos.
- 6. Members Photocopies to be attached: a) PAN Card c) ASI Membership Card d) Aadhar Card

Admission Fees:(One Time Only At The Time Of Admission)

1. Below 30 years	Rs.	5,000/-
2. Between 30 to 35 years	Rs.	6,000/-
3. Between 35 to 40 years	Rs.	8,000/-
4. Between 40 to 45 years	Rs.	10,000/-
5. Between 45 to 50 yrs	Rs.	15,000
6. Between 50 to 55 yrs	Rs.	20,000/-
7. Between 55 to 60 yrs	Rs.	25,000/-
8. Between 60 to 65 vrs	Rs.	30.000/-

This is the only fees that a Full Life ASI member pays according to age to enroll. Pl see Clause V of constitution.

Annual Subscription (To Be Paid Annually from July every year)

Every member of the scheme shall pay Rs 1000/- per member every year. Pl see Clause VI.

Fraternity Contribution(FC) (To Be Paid Annually from July every year)

Every member of the scheme shall pay a fraternity contribution of Rs. 500/- per death (if any) for a continuous period of 25 years. FC (No of Deaths X Rs 500/-) have to be paid together every year on notification. eg. If there are 5 deaths in a year then FC will be Rs 2500/- for that year. PI see Clause VII.

Honorary member

Those who make payments for 25 years continuously need not make any further FC payment. They will remain as honorary members of the scheme with all the benefits of an ordinary member. Pl see Clause VIII.

Member's disqualification

- 1. Every member of the scheme shall pay the Annual Charge of Rs 1000/- and fraternity contribution at the rate of Rs. 500/- per death. The secretary of the scheme will send individual demand notice in the 3rd week of July showing the exact amount to be paid. The last date for payment without fine is 30th September every year, after that there will be a fine of Rs. 100/- per month. If the member does not make the payment within 90 days, a registered notice will be send at members cost. The membership shall stand terminated if the member does not make the payment within 15days of receipt of the notice. Please see Clause IX of the constitution.
 2. If a member supplies any wrongful information in his application form or at any time during his membership term by which, he violates any provision and tries to obtain any benefit under this scheme, then after giving him an opportunity of being heard before the Managing Committee, if his explanation is not found satisfactory, the Managing Committee of the scheme shall terminate the membership of the member concerned subject to
- After termination of membership of any member, he can rejoin the scheme as a new member by paying stipulated admission fees.
- 4. If any member, at any time, for any reason ceases to be a member of ASI his membership of this scheme shall cease automatically but if such a member revives his membership of ASI within a period of 6 months, he can get his membership of the scheme revived on payment of stipulated fees. If he does not get his membership revived within the stipulated period, he will be treated as a voluntarily retired member.
